2022 statistics that work

10 northeast Indiana counties-

Goodwill's service area covers Allen, Adams, DeKalb, Huntington, Jay, Lagrange, Noble, Steuben, Wells, and Whitley.

88% attendance and 100% financial giving—from volunteer Goodwill Board of Directors.

94 cents of every dollar—goes back to Goodwill's local mission in Northeast Indiana.

\$4 million or 59% of total payroll—earned by 278 Goodwill employees with disabilities and employment barriers.

\$514,953—projected wages of clients placed into work evaluations or community employment. Starting wages ranged from \$8.50 to \$24 hourly; 74% of clients placed into employment have multiple disabilities and 26% a single disability.

\$1.7 million in federal, state and local taxes—paid by Goodwill and 366 employees working for Goodwill in jobs including employment services staff, store staff, truck drivers, material handlers, ecommerce technicians, administrative and support staff.

452 people—who worked for Goodwill, received case management, and/or advocacy services.

345 high school and college students with disabilities—benefited from job exploration counseling, work-based learning experiences, counseling on postsecondary opportunities and skills in workplace readiness and self-advocacy.

19 northeast Indiana schools—partnered with Goodwill to provide Pre-Employment Transition Services to students.

444,690 purchases—were made in Goodwill's 8 thrift stores by women, men, teenagers, families, teachers, veterans and senior citizens who were provided with lowcost, high-quality **sustainable shopping experiences.**

58,225 shoppers—made online purchases through Goodwill's E-commerce sites.

\$596,225 was collected in sales tax— through Goodwill stores and remitted to the State of Indiana.

3,381,090 pounds — of donated textiles, shoes, cardboard, books, computers, computer accessories, cell phones and other goods were repurposed or recycled and kept out of the waste stream.
